

You've experienced it yourself

- the most mundane, unglamorous things become
so valuable, so useful,
you never want to be
without them. Our most
recently completed project
downtown is certain to be
one of those.

People will regularly walk the equivalent of two city blocks to visit a mall, a big box retailer, or even a grocery store without giving it a thought. But if they can't park directly in front of the place they want to visit on Main Street, we hear complaints about the lack of parking downtown. It's in the nature of small downtowns that there's never enough parking, but that doesn't mean we aren't working on it every day. Our most recent project downtown is one of the most exciting and impactful we've ever done. And it's mostly asphalt.

For several years, we've been working on an agreement with Main Street Church (formerly Tucker First Baptist) for the public to be able to use their vast parking during the times that the church is not. On August 14, we held the Grand Opening!

This is a first-of-its-kind for Tucker – a cooperative venture with a major downtown property owner to create shared parking and a win-win-win situation. It results in just over 100 spaces available for use by students at Tucker High School and employees of downtown businesses, both of which will keep that many spaces open for visitors and the general public. It's of course to be used exclusively by the church on Sundays and for certain other events, but there will be plenty of signage to make clear when it's "offline". We've also resurfaced the lot and striped the shared spaces in a special green to make them stand out. We will be responsible for keeping it clean and well maintained through our public works department. And even better, the City has a new webpage to let you know when and where you can park downtown at all times, including pictures and directions! You can get more information at Tuckerga.gov/parking.

We're so grateful for this collaborative effort and hope it will lead to many more. It's a great demonstration of the innovative community spirit in Tucker, and a huge practical help to the success of our downtown. See you on Main Street!

COLLABORATION OF THE ARTS

There is a long debate in academia about what core characteristics must be present to signify the start of civilization. Is it when a form of government or religion is established? Perhaps it was when injuries were first tended to and allowed to heal and recover. Others will say it is the establishment of culture through the arts, that having the luxury of time and ability to create beauty is what is the defining element of civilized society.

Obviously, our present day is considered a civilized society. We live in an age of readily available education, established governance, and ever evolving and improving medical care. The arts are revered and celebrated worldwide and are part of the foundation of the education system. It is proven and accepted that learning to read music feeds and grows both sides of the human brain aiding in comprehension and computing. Painting, throwing pottery and performing can release endorphins to help stabilize our emotional and mental health. Those that are not called to create also benefit in similar ways just by observation and enjoyment.

Tucker has many avenues to create, enjoy, and celebrate the arts and artists. Years ago, as the Tucker community was rallying together to create their own local government another group established the first local community theatre. The Main Street Theatre grew and was established from a post in a local Facebook group in 2014. Starting with a single full-scale production, the group has expanded each year in their leadership and in their entertainment offerings. Their season now holds three full scale productions, a murder mystery dining experience, as well as holiday collaborations with the City. In celebration of their 10-year anniversary, Main Street Theatre is bringing back their inaugural production of Harvey this fall. The announced cast is a delightful blend of long-established Tucker actors with new-

to-Tucker talent. With a mission "to produce

superior theatrical experiences that entertain

and connect the community of Tucker with the arts and each other", Main Street

Theatres has proven itself successful, inclusive and most of all entertaining!

Local artists have met for years as the Tucker Arts Guild and have had opportunities to exhibit their work at the Northlake-Barbara Loar library, Tucker Recreation Center and the original City Hall on Adrian Street. In recent years, another organization has come together to include all aspects of art and creativity. A band of poets, dancers, singers, crafters and all types of creatives gathered in 2021 to support one another and from that initial meeting the Tucker Arts Alliance was formed.

Formed to be an alliance of creativity, the group has set out to explore what they can be and what they can do to be a unifying and encouraging force in the Tucker arts community. They have been participants in ARTucker, Tucker Day and Juneteenth, and their support has been noticed. Tucker-Reid Cofer Library reached out to the group and invited them to display a curated exhibit including all mediums. At the time of publishing, the Alliance will have completed the call for artists and be in the process of selecting the artists and creations to be displayed. Cleverly scheduled between early voting and the traditional gift giving holidays, the exhibition will be open to the public Saturday October 12 through Friday December 6 during the normal library hours.



Starting this month, another exciting and interactive art exhibit is set to open in Northlake Mall. The Science Gallery Atlanta, affiliated with Emory University, has moved its location from Pullman Yards to Tucker. Guiding the decision was the ideal location of the mall, ample parking and variety of dining and shopping options. The Science Gallery Network is "an international collaboration of leading universities dedicated to public engagement through interdisciplinary art-science initiatives". Their first show is an immersive exhibit showcasing sustainability and empowering people to discover their path forward

toward a more resilient future. Titled 'Resilient Earth" the show runs from

September 14, 2024 through April 30, 2025.

Music is the most accessible of the arts. We have free and constant access through FM radio waves and built-in instruments through our vocal cords. Churches have always been a source and an outlet for music through choirs and two local churches have opened their programs to the public. The Tucker Community Singers meet out of First Christian Church of Atlanta on weekly basis with a mission to showcase "hidden talents, promote inclusion and celebrate the diversity of Tucker through singing". The singers perform throughout the year in collaboration with other ensembles around the Metro Atlanta area.

Tucker First United Methodist Church has launched a new children's ministry called Tucker ACTS (Acting, Creative, Theatre, Song). Offering affordable and accessible education in music, theatre and visual arts, the first production will be this fall with "Godspell". The ministry also offers weekly group and individual lessons in voice, piano, guitar and other stringed instruments.

Tucker has been a community for over a century, a city for almost a decade and through the dedication and sweat equity of local volunteers and creatives, the arts culture is expanding and becoming more accessible. Tucker's civilization is being defined an you can play a part, as Main Street Theatre says, "Come play with us!"



CITY HALL UPDATE

CITY COUNCIL UPDATE

Tucker's Mayor and Council met only once last month. It is a summer tradition to cancel the second meeting of July but this year they opted for the second meeting of August. The action was approved unanimously in the consent agenda which also covered meeting minutes, engagement for the financial audit and contracts for the Hugh Howell Road safety study and an amendment to lower the price of the FLOCK license plate reader service.

Returning to the agenda for second reads and approvals were the Special Land Use Permit to allow for a drive-thru at the proposed Fifth Third Bank on Lavista, an ordinance amendment to terminology relating to the land approval step of the occupational tax certificate process, and an update to the code on the manner of appeal in several chapters of City Code related to alcoholic beverages, land development, municipal court and signs.

Following the success of the new shared parking lot for downtown with Main Street Church, the City approved the resurfacing of the shared CSX parking lot between

Railroad Avenue and the railroad. Staff members identified, applied for and won funding though a Georgia Department of Transportation Local Maintenance and Improvement Grant (LMIG) for majority of the cost. Repaying of Lilburn Stone Mountain Road is included in the contract.

Also approved in the meeting:

- A resolution to adopt the Parks and Recreation Master Plan Five-Year Update
- Phase 2 electrical improvements at the Fitzgerald Sports Complex park
- · Purchase of 10 fleet vehicles
- Contract with Georgia Power for underground utility relocation at the Tucker Town Green

The contract to purchase a mobile LED scoreboard was tabled to be brought back in September.


SMOKE RISE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL DR. KRYSTYE TATUM

BLACK ELEPHANT DESIGNS

She gets it from her mama and her grandma.

From a young age Brittiany Hubbard's mother and grandmother influenced her to be the woman she is today. Hubbard is a business minded woman with a strong sense for fashion that's been honed over the lives of three generations of stylish women. That sense of fashion led Hubbard to create Black Elephant Designs, a clothing company with a focus on maternity wear.

Growing up Hubbard looked up to her mother who was always well dressed and working for corporate America. "I always wanted to be a businesswoman now that I think about it because I would carry a briefcase to school and wear penny loafers," Hubbard said. "I always wanted to be just like her."

Hubbard's grandma taught her about fashion and sewing. In her adolescent years, her grandma used to take her to the pattern store and sit her down to view all the patterns and fabrics. This helped her find her passion for fashion. The young girl grew up and went to school to learn more. She earned her BFA in Fashion Design at the Art Institute of Atlanta in 2017.

For her senior project she created maternity wear. Hubbard wanted to take her designs in this direction because she had a desire to cater to women going through pregnancy.

"I like to see it when women say, 'Oh this feels good, it looks good," Hubbard said, "because when you are pregnant you don't always feel your best. You are gaining weight, sometimes you lose certain aspects of your beauty...Clothes may not feel comfortable. There is a whole lot that goes into it, so if I can make a woman feel beautiful at the end of the day, that is what really matters."

Hubbard founded Black Elephant Designs in 2018 and had to pivot when Covid hit two years later. During that time she began designing masks, which expanded

her portfolio. Soon another major change occurred: the entrepreneur moved her company to Tucker in 2021.

Since making the move to Tucker, Hubbard has enjoyed the change. She likes the location, she loves the smalltown feel Tucker offers, her customers are friendly and she enjoys the supportive community of Tucker.

Black Elephant Designs has come a long way and overcome multiple challenges, which Hubbard attributes to her strong support system. She admits she is blessed with good people around her.

One of Hubbard's blessings is her righthand man Byung Yoon, her Director of Manufacturing. Yoon brings a wealth of experience from working on Michelle Obama's inaugural gown, working with Proenza Schouler and Tommy Hilfiger to working at Fashion Week. Hubbard says he helps her get the look she is imagining whenever she creates her pieces.







September 12, 2024 6 p.m.

The City of Tucker is working with TSW on the creation of a City Standard Guidebook. The guidebook will identify a set of required products and design standards for city projects, including city signage (gateway, monument, wayfinding, etc.), landscaping (trees, shrubs, ground cover, etc.), retaining walls and fences, benches, trash cans, bollards, lighting, etc. By designing and creating a set of standards unique to Tucker, public projects across the city will have consistency that will create a unique sense of place and add character to the city as a whole.
