

FROM THE MAYOR

One of the prime goals of incorporating the City of Tucker back in 2013 through 2015 was to improve the quality of life for all of us. Usually when we think of that phrase, we think of safe streets and neighborhoods, new economic development, plenty of shops and restaurants, and beautiful parks, some full of activities, and others with peaceful places of respite. Our reasoning for cityhood rested on the idea that there

were many government responsibilities we could execute better for ourselves as a local government than could a larger, more distant government. We had a vision that harnessing a locally controlled Code Enforcement Department along with our own Planning and Zoning decisions and Parks and Rec could elevate quality of life here better than any

other means. But before you can do any of that, there are sometimes greater threats that have to be attended to as a top priority. It turns out two of the dams in our parks fall into that category.

When we assumed responsibility for our parks system from DeKalb County, we very intentionally left responsibility for

responsibility for the dams at Henderson's Lake Erin and John's Homestead's Twin Brothers Lake with the County. They and we had long been aware of urgent needs for repairs at both. Over the next few years, we learned just how great the need was: The Environmental Protection Division classified the Lake Erin dam in Henderson Park as Category 1 and several inspection reports cited numerous deficiencies including seepage through the dam, vegetation along it, an inadequate outlet control structure and an outdated emergency spillway. Eventually (in 2020) the EPD issued a Notice of Violation and rated the dam to be in poor condition, noting the potential for catastrophic failure and potential loss of life in such an event. Twin Brothers didn't pose that extent of danger, but it was certainly in jeopardy of failure that could result in millions of dollars of damage and was already damaging nearby property.

When the City took over responsibility for Public Works last year, we also took responsibility for repairing these dams. Immediately, we started the work to learn the full extent of need and negotiate with the County to share the cost since the maintenance had already been deferred for many years. The County ultimately pledged \$1.4 million of ARPA funds to aid in the rehabilitation of the Lake Erin dam. Although we were left to deal with Twin Brothers on our own, our Parks leadership was able to secure a \$2.5 million grant to cover a large portion of that cost.

Just a few weeks ago, the Council approved the construction contract for the rehabilitation of the Lake Erin dam. In addition to the money pledged by the county, the City budgeted \$1,171,450 in the FY25 capital fund. This project is big. One of the biggest we have ever done when it comes to level of importance to the life, health and safety of our residents, as

well as length of time and impact on our daily lives. Part of our largest and most visited park will be closed to the public for about eight months starting in late February or early March. The closure includes the playgrounds, pavilion and lower parking lot of the Livsey Road side of the park.

In order to restore the dam, lake and wetlands at John's Homestead, we will also be closing parts of that park for an extended period, which is another huge undertaking. To learn more and keep up to date on the progress of the projects we will be hosting a Public Information Open House on January 16 at City Hall, and you are encouraged to attend. To stay up to date on all our capital projects, including these

CITY HALL UPDATE

JOHNS HOMESTEAD DAM PROJECT

Johns Homestead is a unique park in Tucker due to the fact that it is the site for one of the oldest homes still standing in DeKalb County, is a walking retreat for local birders and home to a popular fishing spot. Twin Brothers Lake has been in the hearts of many residents of Tucker for decades, but the dam is aging and in need of some major repairs.


Dam repairs are costly and not something to rush. Starting in 2022, the City has been in the process of inspecting, evaluating and designing improvements to the structure that splits Twin Brothers Lake.

Funded in part by a \$2.5 million grant, the construction total awarded to North Georgia Concrete is \$4,008,126.15 and includes an observation deck, trail markers, new access points from the surrounding

neighborhoods and more in addition to repairing the safety needs of the dam structure.

As with any construction, it will be messy and ugly during the repairs and improvements, but the end result will be worth it for both safety and aesthetics. The project pages on the website will be kept up-to-date and the public is always welcome to reach out with any questions to info@tuckerga.gov.

There will be a Public Information Open House on January 16 from 6-7:30 p.m. at City Hall. This meeting will cover information on both the Lake Erin and the Twin Brothers dam projects.

MEETING RECAP

CITY COUNCIL UPDATE

The City of Tucker Mayor and Council met for the sole meeting of the month and the last meeting of the year on December 9. The City's four municipal court bailiffs lead the pledge after being introduced by the City Attorney.

The Mayor took a moment during his comments to allow Councilmember Virginia Rece to speak about an agenda item regarding building bathrooms in William McKinley Peters Park. Rece expressed gratitude to DeKalb County Commissioners Steve Bradshaw and Robert Patrick for their help in funding both the design and construction of the bathrooms. Commissioner Bradshaw took a moment to say good-bye as his term has come to an end.



Prior to approving the agenda for the evening, the Mayor requested to move the approval of the appointment of the Chief Judge to the first item and add a contract for Engineering staff. The Council then unanimously approved the amended agenda, the consent agenda and the appointment of Judge Nicholas to continue as Chief Judge for the City's municipal court.

Three presentations covered the creation of a commercial streetlight district, a PILOT wi-fi and safety measure program on the City's trail system, and the upcoming dam rehabilitation projects at Johns Homestead and Henderson Park.

In old business the Council held second reads and public hearings for a SLUP on 4419 Cowan Road to allow a multi-family use abutting a residential zone, and a rezoning to allow the parking of commercial vehicles and outdoor storage at 4850 Hammerhill Road. Both passed unanimously.

New business covered a first read to codify film permitting in the City and a resolution was passed to clarify language of the code regarding property acquisition. The Council and Mayor then approved three contracts:

- Design contract for Lawrenceville Highway Intersection Improvements
- Contract award for the 5-year update to the Transportation and Trail Master Plan
- · Contract award for the Peters Park restrooms

Tucker's Mayor and Council then recessed to executive session but returned with no action except to adjourn the meeting.

BUSINESS OF THE MONTH

MONTERREY MEXICAN RESTAURANT

Celebrating 40 years of quality food and service, Monterrey Mexican Restaurant was once on the verge of closing its doors. With grit, ingenuity and community support, this Tucker staple has overcome much and earned its seat as one of the areas longest running restaurants.

Juan Alexandro Onate now manages the restaurant that his father, Juan Mannuel, opened and poured his life and passion into,

"We're the originators," Alexandro who helps manages the restaurant said. "We are the first [Mexican restaurant] in Tucker for sure. I would say that is what makes us stand out."

Mannuel grew up in Mexico and at the age of nine he moved with his family to California. He made his way to Georgia in his late teens to join his wife's uncle in the restaurant business. When he took a leap of faith and opened his own restaurant, he had his eyes set on Tucker. Mannuel initially opened his restaurant in Northlake Plaza in April of 1985. Alexandro shared that the location was desirable due to its location near the mall and several manufacturing businesses off Montreal Road, which his father figured would bring many patrons from near and far.

Monterrey struggled in the beginning, as many new restaurants do. Business was slow and Mannuel feared he would have to close the doors for good before the end of his first year. In a last-ditch effort, Mannuel bought advertising space to promote the restaurant and offer deeply discounted specials.

"My dad used the last money he had," Alexandro said. "There was billboard truck going around town and he put a billboard up. He said all food is half off on Friday, Saturday and Sunday in early March. Come that Friday it snows and no result. This happened in 1986. Saturday rolls around supper busy and it's packed. They called my aunts, my uncles and everybody to come help!"

The weekend of specials worked and got the word out about Monterrey. Slowly, business picked up and Mannuel was able to save the restaurant and even move to a stand-alone location where it still serves the community today.

"We have a very loyal following. We've seen generations of family come here," Alexandro said. One couple have been regulars since they started dating in high school. Monterrey has remained a part of their family history. Alexandro said he loves that they can see families grow and be part of the Monterrey family. The staff at Monterrey know a lot of their customers by name and know some of their usual orders. Alexandro says that a lot of their customers keep coming back, even dignitaries.

In 2014, a United States Ambassador to the United Nations, Samantha Power, returned to Monterrey for a taste from her high school years,

"Out of everything she could have ordered she ordered the taco salad," Alexandro said. "She comes up to pay and she looked at me and says hey you look familiar. She asks does Juan still works here. I told her that's my dad, he still owns it but he is not here as much as he used to be. She said I remember this place so much when I was in high school... We would go to the movies and come eat here."

Alexandro appreciates moments like that and the Tucker community for supporting his family's business for 40 years. While he, his father and the Monterrey staff have done their part to secure the success of the restaurant, he also believes the Tucker community is what allowed Monterrey's longevity,

"I always say good food brings customers in and good service brings customers in more frequently," Alexandro said.
