

FROM THE MAYOR



People I talk to around town sometimes wonder who the real decision makers are in the City of Tucker. Is it the Mayor? The Mayor in consultation with members of the City Council? Is it our staff subject matter experts who provide professional guidance to us? Maybe it is our City Manager or department heads? Or is it the appointed members of our various boards and commissions? The truth is, all these have input into our decision-making, through very prescribed processes that include input from the public. In the end, all policy decisions are finalized by a vote of the Mayor and City Council, working with the benefit of all

that input. In that sense your elected officials are the decision-makers for Tucker. But in a real sense, that's not where the power to decide begins or ends.

All of what we decide is not only book-ended by the will of the voters, but they (you) are part of the process throughout. Not only do you vote your elected officials in or out of office, but you have opportunity at every turn to influence our decision-making. No, we don't take a poll on every issue, or decide them based on how many people turn out to a meeting or sign a petition – there's a constant tension of whether the law, the data, our finances, and what's best for the city as a whole, align with the preferences of the loudest voices we hear from. But it all goes into the mix.

This is an election year in Tucker, which is your greatest opportunity to influence decision-making. Not only will a relative handful of voters decide who serves in these roles next, but those voters' choices will be limited to the very few willing to put their name on the ballot and endure the slings and arrows of not only running for office, but also then serving you.

Tucker's City Charter limits council members to two four-year terms and the mayor to three four-year terms, which means we regularly must replace the Mayor and/or members of council. Just last month the current Council and I approved the qualifying fees for those who want seek office later this year. The deadline to decide will be in August but those who are thinking about it should consider going ahead and filing a Declaration of Intent form now, so they can legally start raising and spending money for their campaigns. That information can be found on our website at tuckerga.gov/elections.

If you are at all considering running for office, I urge you to learn how our government works. Contact your current or former elected officials to get a real idea of what's involved and why it's so important we have quality candidates. Also, the City hosts an in-depth course that covers the functions and operations of most departments and operations called University of Government Affairs Tucker. It runs from September through March, meets monthly, and you are welcome to attend any or all of their sessions. See our city calendar at tuckerga. gov/calendar Another option is to volunteer for an appointed position on one of our boards or commissions. You can find the form to express interest in serving on tuckerga.gov/boards-and-commissions.

Most importantly, as Tucker voters, I implore you stay involved, and make yourselves knowledgeable about how elected officials affect quality of life in our community. Attend our council meetings or watch them online, read our magazine, explore our website, and ask us questions. Each of the council members are listed on the website and we all welcome your feedback.

Senator Sally Harrell was first elected to the Georgia Senate in 2018 to serve the 40th Senate District. She serves on the Senate Government Oversight, Health and Human Services, Higher Education, and State Institutions and Property committees. A champion of women and family issues, she currently serves as the Senate Co-Chair of the Georgia Women's Legislative Caucus and Vice Chair of both the Dekalb Delegation and the Working Families Caucus. Recent legislative accomplishments include reducing the cost of higher education in Georgia, expanding the number of Georgians with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD) who receive Medicaid waivers for Home & Community-Based services, and mandating Provider Rate Study Reviews for IDD service providers every four years.

Sen. Harrell was a member of the Georgia House of Representatives from 1999 to 2005, and prior to serving in the Legislature, Sen. Harrell was the Executive Director of the Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies Coalition of Georgia.

A NEWS FROM CITY HALL

FELLOWSHIP ROAD TRAFFIC UPDATE

The long awaited and needed dedicated left turn lane and signal have been installed! One of the most requested traffic improvements throughout the years has been to improve the left turn onto Lavista Road from Fellowship Road when heading north.

The City started the process over a year ago by re-aligning the traffic heading south across Lawrenceville Highway as that was a great safety risk. Earlier this year, the length of road between Lavista Road and Lawrenceville Highway was restriped and median added to create a dedicated left turn lane onto Lavista. Medians were also added to prevent left turns across traffic onto Second Ave.





PUBLIC WORKS UPDATE

Since adding Public Works to city services in July of 2023, the department has completed 1,930 work orders with only 247 currently outstanding. Important work improving the daily lives, and commutes, of residents was the goal and it is a promise kept.

An added service that the South isn't quite used to as it isn't often needed; was the proactive approach and quick response during the two snow storms of January. Prior to the first fall of a snowflake the Public Works crews were out brining the roads in preparation and once there was accumulation, they went out to plow and salt to stave off freezing roads.





BUSINESS OF THE MONTH ATLANTA SCHOOL OF GYMNASTICS

Tumbling, cartwheels and front rolls are childhood milestones that are imperative to the development of human brains. As parents do their best to provide environments with healthy yet safe options, most look to outside help to aid in the growth and development of their children. A common and smart option is gymnastics. Here in Tucker, the logical choice is the Atlanta School of Gymnastics.

The Atlanta School of Gymnastics was started in 1976 by Tom and Bunny Cook. As the first gymnastics facility in the state of Georgia, ASG has trained countless standout gymnasts and has served as a resource in the Tucker community and to those near and far.

"It is about community," ASG owner Stacy Cook said. "Community building and team building is what we do. We teach kids good values to become good role models and teach them to be good students/ athletes."

One prominent figure that came out of ASG is USA Olympian Kathy Johnson. Johnson was trained by Tom at ASG. It is where she developed her skills to be on the 1980 and 1984 USA Olympic teams. She became a two-time Olympic medalist, winning silver and bronze in the 1984 Olympics. Kristie Phillips is also on the Wall of Fame at ASG. Philips served as an alternate for Team USA in the 1988 Games. Philips earned several medals competing in the Pan American Games.

Tom passed away in 2009 leaving his wife Stacy to run the facility. Shortly before his passing, Tom was inducted to the Region VII Gymnastics Hall of Fame. The work he started at ASG continues in the coaches and staff that share his passion for molding gymnasts to be competitors both on and off the mat.

The Atlanta School of Gymnastics has positively impacted many people, including one of their students turned coach. Christopher Taylor trained at ASG and moved on to the University of Iowa Gymnastics team as a walk-on. After working as an engineer, Taylor came home to ASG. He and the rest of the staff care about their athletes, and it shows when they interact with them.


"I do know for sure our coaching staff is very big with connecting with our kids," Taylor said. "We love the gymnastics but we also love the connection part."

Ginger Parauka is one of the coaches at ASG who brings 17 years of experience to ASG. Parauka loves the joy that coaching gymnastics brings to her.

"When a kid is struggling and they finally hit that skill and they are jumping up and down and the whole team swarms them there is so much energy," Parauka said. "There are so many great moments."

Owner Stacy has experienced special moments throughout her years at the school, as well. One of her fondest memories is with her sister. With an 18 year difference in their ages, Stacy started to go to ASG to support her and watched her grow her talent to the collegiate level, winning a seat on the gymnastics team at the Air Force Academy,

"It was a dream to see my sister thrive like that and see all of the girls that got scholarships," Stacy said.

CITIZEN OF THE MONTH SCOTT BRADY

American Legion Post 207 is proud to announce that its Commander, Scott Brady, has been selected to receive the prestigious "Hometown Hero Award" by the Home Depot Foundation.

The award was presented during halftime of the Peach Bowl, the college football playoff game between Texas and Arizona State, on January 1, 2025. The "Hometown Hero Award" recognizes a veteran who has made significant and measurable contributions to improve their community.

Scott Brady, a former Marine veteran, exemplifies this spirit of service and dedication. In November 2022, when American Legion Post 207 faced the threat of closure due to financial constraints, Scott led a capital campaign to raise \$216,000 in just three months.

Since being elected as Commander, Scott created a new mission for the Post dedicated to preventing veteran suicide. The Post's new motto is Rescue, Restore, and Repay:

- Rescue: Veterans in Need
- Restore: Mind, Body, and Spirit
- Repay: Community with Unwavering
 Support

Under Scott's leadership, the Post has organized numerous successful events, including Memorial Day barbecues, Veterans Day 5K walk/runs, and the establishment




of a scholarship at Tucker High School for students demonstrating exceptional community leadership.

In collaboration with the Home Depot Foundation, Scott recently coordinated the 2024 Veterans Day Community Volunteer Day, where 250 Home Deport corporate employees improved the Post's exterior with landscaping and a new community garden. In a generous gesture, the Home Depot Foundation also surprised the Post with a \$25,000 grant to assist with the remaining \$200,000 needed for its capital campaign to rebuild the Post. Post #207 has faced tremendous challenges since tragically burning down in 2019, including new ordinances, insurance issues, and COVID-related construction delays. Thanks to Scott's leadership and the support of the community, the Post is on the path to recovery but still need additional funds to complete the rebuilding of the Post. WHAT HAPPENED AT THE COUNCIL MEETING? CITY COUNCIL UPDATE



The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Coach Lakita Ford, City of Tucker Athletics Manager and King Murphy of the Tucker Express Basketball League.

The Tucker Mayor and Council met for their first meeting of 2025 on January 13 with a full quorum in attendance.

Due to only a single meeting in December, the meeting had two presentations concerning parking in downtown and the possibility of enforcing a time limit for public parking. There was also an initial presentation on House Bill 581 that was approved by Georgia voters in November of 2024. The City will need to decide to either opt-in or optout by March 1, 2025 and are holding three public hearing meetings to discuss and receive feedback from the community. The meetings are scheduled for February 10 during the 7 p.m. regular scheduled meeting, February 24 at 10 a.m. and again at 6 p.m. with a vote of Council to follow.

Following the November 2024 interim financial report, the Mayor and Council heard and approved the second read of an ordinance to add film permitting to the Tucker Code. The City is still working with the DeKalb Entertainment Commission to vet all paperwork and issue the permits at this time.

Two first reads followed: a rezoning to allow for commercial use at 5950 Hugh Howell Road, and to amend Chapter 10 of the Tucker code with small changes to bring the code up to date and editing errors. The Mayor and Council then approved the Resolution to Adopt Findings of Blight at 4971 Lavista Road, and to approve a revised agreement with Jacobs Project Management for engineering services.

The City of Tucker meets every second and fourth Monday of each month, unless otherwise advertised, at City Hall located at 1975 Lakeside Parkway, Suite 350b, Tucker, GA 30084.
